Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Arrowsic qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Arrowsic Fire Station on Thursday, the 16th of June A.D. 2022, at six thirty in the evening, to act on the following articles to wit:

ELECTIONS

Art. 1. To elect by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Eloise Vitelli was nominated and seconded to serve as Moderator at said meeting. There were no other nominations. Eloise Vitelli was elected unanimously.

Moderator Vitelli recognized the passing of Dick Elwell and long-time resident of Arrowsic. This year's Town Report is dedicated to Dick and his service to the community. Moderator Vitelli also recognized the Arrowsic Election workers for their receipt of the Spirit of America Foundation Award.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk for FY 2022-23.

Barbara Boyce was nominated and seconded for Town Clerk for FY 2022-23. There were no other nominations. Barbara Boyce was elected unanimously.

Art. 3. To elect by ballot, for a three-year term:

Selectman, Assessor & Overseer of the Poor,

Surveyor of Wood, Lumber, and Bark, Fence Viewer

DeeDee Jorgensen was nominated for Select Person for a three-year term. There were no other nominations. DeeDee Jorgensen was elected unanimously.

Art. 4. To elect for FY 2022-23:

A Treasurer - Treasurer: Steven Bonine was nominated and seconded for Treasurer for FY 2022-23. There were no other nominations. Steven Bonine was elected unanimously.

A Tax Collector - Rachel Strachan was nominated and seconded for Tax Collector for FY 2022-23. There were no other nominations. Rachel Strachan was elected unanimously.

Any other Town Officers – There were no other elections for Town Offices.

Discussion: Jim Stump asked what the actual FY 20-21 expenditures were. Select person DeeDee Jorgensen responded that there were no uncollected ambulance fees for FY 20-21.

Art. 42. To see what sum the Town will vote to appropriate from surplus for reducing the amount of money to be raised by taxes. Selectmen recommend \$10,000

Art. 43. To see if the Town would vote to increase the property tax levy limit of \$388,701 established for the Town by State law, if the municipal budget approved under the preceding articles results in a tax commitment that is greater than this property tax levy limit.

Discussion: Jim Stump asked if we know what the actual property tax levy limit will be? Select Person, Walter Briggs advised that it will be \$388,701

Karen Robbins asked if the figure includes the RSU1 budget that was passed? Selectman Briggs responded that it does not.

Sheila Spear, Town Administrator explained that the State requires the Town to give permission to exceed the property tax levy limit in the event of unexpected expenses.

Art 43 was passed by ballot by a vote of 44 yes and 0 no.

Art. 44. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Conservation Commission to approve a provisional harvest or conservation closure for alewife and blueback herring in 2022. The harvest plan will be submitted by the Conservation Commission setting forth the exact conditions under which alewives may be taken, all in accordance with good conservation practices to conserve and protect the Town's resource. This plan will be submitted to the Department of Marine Resources with Town of Arrowsic approval. If any Municipal rights are sold, monies will be deposited in the designated Alewife Account.

Art. 44 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 46. To see if the Town will vote to continue to allocate all revenues from the sale of shellfish licenses, and any fines received for violation of the Shellfish Conservation Ordinance, to the dedicated Shellfish Conservation Fund, to be used by the Shellfish Conservation Committee for shellfish management, conservation, and ordinance enforcement. Current fund balance: \$4,480

Art. 46 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 47. To see if the Town will vote to collect all Watercraft Excise Taxes in a dedicated Water Access Fund. Current fund balance: \$89,525.10

Discussion: Michael Kreindler addressed the issue of pursuing accessible water for the Town. Until there is a process with set standards and a means to address the suitability of water access Mr. Kreindler is going to vote against the article.

Jody Jones spoke about the magic of the access to Sewall Pond. She will be voting for the article.

Art. 47 was moved, seconded, and passed with 4 voters in opposition.

Art. 48. To see if the Town will vote to allocate all revenues from dog license fees to a dedicated Animal Control Account and authorize the Selectmen to draw from that account for the purpose of funding animal control work in town.

Art. 48 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 49. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to accept and expend the following monies: miscellaneous contributions, donations, grants, and reimbursements.

Art 49 was moved seonded and passed unanimously

Art. 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to draw from surplus such funds as necessary for tax abatements due to overpaid taxes.

Art. 50 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Discussion: Jim Davis asked if the Town has ever disposed of real estate acquired by the town for nonpayment of taxes. Michael Kreindler, former Codes Enforcement officer for the Town, responded that it has happened in the past. Mr. Davis asked if the sale of Town owned properties must be publicized. Select Board member Will Neilson said he is not aware that the sale must be publicized; however, the Town makes every effort to avoid acquiring such properties.

Art. 51 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 52. To see if the Town will vote to allocate all proceeds from the sale of tax delinquent property to the Undesignated Surplus.

Art. 52 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 53. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 53 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 54. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to utilize balances in Town dedicated funds to postpone or eliminate the need to borrow in anticipation of taxes. Funds reduced in this way would be restored with incoming tax revenues.

Art. 54. Was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 55. To see what sum the Town will vote to authorize for Annual Interest on all taxes paid 60 days after posting. Selectmen recommend 4.0% (State Maximum Allowed—8%)

Art. 55 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 56. To see if the Town will vote to establish a dedicated fund for roads maintenance and to transfer any unused portion of the approved paving Budget for future paving of roads.

Discussion: Jim Stump, chair of the Road Commission discussed the reason for Art. 56. The paving schedule has been difficult due to when funds are approved and available vs. when the paving company can do the work. This article allows for flexibility in the ability to pay; that is, the opportunity to schedule paving when we can best get it done. The paving company may be able to complete some road work by the end of August. Jim also wanted to recognize Dick Elwell and the wonderful work he did on the road commission during his 30-year tenure. "Couldn't have done it without him."

Art. 56 was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously.

Art. 57. To see if the town will approve a resolution proposed by the Arrowsic Conservation Commission
To enable the Town's participation in the State's Community Resilience Partnership as set forth on the attachment to this warrant.

Discussion: Karen Robbins a member of the Arrowsic Conservation Commission proposed an amendment to Art. 57 to read "Shall the Town authorize the Select Board, in their discretion, to adopt a municipal resolution enabling the Town to apply for State grants after the town participates in the State's Community Resilience Partnership as further

described in the supplement attached to this warrant and available from the Town Clerk?" This amendment was necessitated due to a scribe's error.

The amendment to article 57 was moved, seconded, and approved unanimously.

Art. 57 as amended was moved, seconded, and approved unanimously.
